**FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK** | Montgomery-Floyd Regional Library has just finished up our fiscal year—which runs from July-June—and now we know that in the past year, we had more than 387,000 visits to the branches, and checked out more than 674,500 items. That's a busy place, especially since Floyd and Montgomery counties combine for a total population of about 115,000 people. We hope the community is receiving great service, and we are grateful for the assistance of the Friends of the Library. Your support makes much of our programming and innovation possible.

Of course numbers like those above tell only part of the

story. I thought I'd share with you some patron comments we've received over the past year to tell the really good part of the story—how the staff meets and exceeds our patrons' expectations:

> "... is very patient and wonderful to work with. I wasn't able to log into my library account on my computer because it was seeing the site as secured when it is not secured. I couldn't do anything on the website. I watched him perform a complicated fix that he learned a couple years ago,

and now I can once again log on. He is very skilled."

"The entire library staff is very friendly and helpful. I appreciate this so much!"

"I was greeted by a lovely young woman at the circulation desk. She greeted me with a warm smile and seemed to be genuinely happy I was there. She was friendly and welcoming. I then met ..., who also greeted me warmly and with a smile. She too was very friendly. Both ladies appeared to genuinely enjoy working at the Chris-



tiansburg Library. I just felt you should know the public notices."

"We are so pleased with the service, materials and programs that were offered at their 'new' hometown library."

"Once we attended our first Storytime with ... at the Blacksburg Library, I knew we would be doing that again. [My daughter] loved all the songs, fingerplays, and book-readings. We would leave the library having learned so much each time! [My daughter] started reading, on her own, around 3 years old and to this day, reading is her

> favorite thing. I can't help but think, all those early library trips played a role in that. And, we're grateful!"

Recently, Floyd Library broadened our ongoing partnership with the hunger relief group *Plenty!* by supporting their "Portable Produce" program. Now when *Plenty!* delivers food to homebound and geographically remote people in Floyd, they also deliver donated books from the library. Here's what the driver, Stormy Brieger of *Plenty!*, wanted us to know: "The kids swarm me. The kids really love it and are excited. Even kids that don't get food deliveries come to get

books. The kids are preschool to high school aged.

One lady I deliver to doesn't have a car or a smart phone or internet, so she really enjoys getting the books."

BLACKSBURG | Hello to our wonderful Friends!

We are gearing up for a busy and fun Fall at the Blacksburg Library! This Fall, in partnership with the Literacy Volunteers of the New River Valley, we will run the second cycle of year 2 of the Family READS program. This is a sponsored program of the American Dream Literacy Initiative, a grant offering of the American Library Association, made possible by the Dollar General Literacy Foundation. Montgomery-Floyd Regional Library is proud to be one of 16 libraries chosen for this grant, and one of two libraries that received year two funding. The program is planned for 7 weeks, from September 25-November 6, 2019

We are fortunate to host the *New Virginians: 1619-2019 and Beyond* traveling exhibit, developed by the Library of Virginia and Virginia Humanities, with support from American Evolution. This beautiful and timely exhibit "highlights the changing demographics of the commonwealth on the eve of the 2020 federal census through a through a series of edited interviews with firstgeneration immigrants and refugees who arrived in Virginia post-1976." Please stop by and explore this exhibit which will be with us from August 12 until September 21, 2019.

In support of the New Virginians traveling exhibit, we

will host a Chinese Cultural Heritage celebration on October 12 from 2:00-3:30 p.m. Groups from the Blacksburg Chinese School, Chinese Senior Group, and the 15 -50 dance group will perform traditional Chinese dances and talk about their historical and cultural significance.

We will host the bi-annual Friends of the Library Book Sale November 14-17. **This includes a Members-only pre-sale from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on November 14th, so don't forget to renew your Friends' membership**. Doors open to the general public at noon on November 14th. Pick up a bag of books for \$5. We will have books for all ages and interests. All proceeds benefit the Friends of the Library

Our bi-annual Craft Swap will take place on Thursday, October 17, so clean out your craft supplies and bring them in. Our bi-annual Clothing Swap will happen on Saturday November 2, so check your closets.

Come see us at the Farmers Market on the second Wednesdays in September, October, and November. We are excited to see new faces and old friends at the Market.

We have had a busy summer with the Summer Reading Program and the picture book reorganization project. All the Summer Reading programs were well attended and the children thoroughly enjoyed them.



The monthly Family Art Day continues to be a success, enjoyed by parents and children alike.

#### New programs:

Expanding on our partnership with *Plenty! Farm & Food Bank*. We are combining their Portable Produce program with our first Mobile Little Library. Plenty! delivers bags of fresh produce to over 60 families and individuals who do not have access to transportation. As a trial, books are being included in three of the nine runs, providing food for the body *and* food for the mind. This appears to be a winning combination. **CHRISTIANSBURG** | The summer was full of outstanding programming and outreach into the community! Our Summer Reading Program was very successful this year, with over 100 more children signing up at the Christiansburg Library than in 2018.

We started off the summer with Little Critters Petting Zoo at beginning of May and over 700 people attended that event. Our Music on the Lawn series has been very successful this year. We added an addition concert to the series this year, bringing our total performances up to five. Both of these are events that we could not without the generous support of the Friends. We also ended Summer with a bagged book sale to benefit the Friends. The Christiansburg Library continues to reach out to the community. We regularly see about 100 people at the
