
This event, hosted by the Friends of the Library, will offer refreshments following the presentation.

Author Talk with Ron Peterson Jr.

Returning to Montgomery-Floyd Regional Library in December will be best-selling author, Ron Peterson Jr., to discuss his latest book, *Eyes of a Monster*, as well as updates on his previous books.

Ron Peterson Jr. is a Virginia-based author whose best-selling true crime books explore compelling mysteries and consistently receive five-star reviews. Peterson's first book, *Under the Trestle*, was selected as one of the Top 100 true crime books of all time and is currently being developed into a documentary film or series with Mactavish Pictures. This book is based on the local Radford University student, Gina Renee Hall, who disappeared in 1980. Stephen Epperly was later arrested and sentenced for her murder, making it Virginia's first ever "no-body" murder trial.

Peterson followed with *Chasing the Squirrel*, the true story of notorious drug smuggler Wally Thrasher, also a case well known to the New River Valley. Thrasher and his wife Olga lived in the NRV while he flew out of Florida and became one of the FBI's most-wanted drug smugglers. Thrasher supposedly died in a fiery plane crash, but an investigation proved that his death was staged. Peterson's book has been optioned for development as a television series by Los-Angeles-based Urban Legends Film Company.

Eyes of a Monster explores the previously unsolved 1981 murder of Hampton, Virginia schoolteacher Olivia Dare Christian. In 2011, the case was re-opened by detective Randy Mayer who, with FBI assistance, uncovered a suspect believed to be a serial killer.

We have an exciting fall planned for our community!

We are excited to host a variety of programming in support of our international community. On September 15, we hosted a multi-lingual storytime, featuring bilingual stories in Chinese, Ukrainian, Spanish, and Farsi as part of the YMCA International Welcome Week programming. Likewise, in partnership with the Literacy Volunteers of the New River Valley, we are hosting not one, but two English Conversation groups for adults. Finally, we are partnering with LVNRV to bring our Family READS program back and we are hoping for a terrific turnout!

In August, Karim Kahn, the MFRL Director, and I were notified that MFRL was award a \$7,000 grant from the Public Library Association and AT&T to offer digital literacy classes through the libraries. We will offer clas-

FLOYD | Hello Friends! There have been some very exciting happenings at Jessie Peterman Memorial Library. In July we opened our Free Fridge! In partnership with Plenty! Farm and Food Bank, the Floyd Free Fridge offers produce and other healthy food for the public. Community Fridge projects are a sustainable, grassroots approach to address food insecurity and to encourage people to make healthy food choices. The fridge was donated by a generous patron and the Floyd Friends paid for a beautiful sign created by local Finn Graphics. Plenty! keeps the fridge stocked with produce and anyone in the community is welcome to visit the fridge and take whatever they need. So far, the fridge has been very popular. Since July, we have been able to give out over 3,000 pounds of food. The Floyd Free Fridge is one of the first of its kind in Virginia! We are very proud and happy to provide our community with this amazing resource.

In addition to the Free Fridge we are now able to offer our patrons a new space within the library. Our Quiet ses in email basics, resume development, and other basic computer courses. This is an additional LVNRV partnership.

Over the last year, we have developed a relationship with Sustainable Blacksburg, Inc. to offer monthly Lunch and Learn workshops. We have offered programs on electronic cars, low waste living with kids, the sharing economy, and our upcoming workshops on Stadium Woods and Home Energy Checks. These workshops have been very popular.

Our crafting workshops are as popular as ever. Our workshops have included Black Glue Art, Worry Pets, a Back to School Bash, among others. I can't wait to see what else my amazingly creative team pulls together. I hope you will follow along on our journey.
