THE BROWN GARDEN | 703 York Dr, Blacksburg. Marcus & Fiona Brown

Located in a long established, charming in-town neighborhood, the Brown Garden began five years ago with some of the lovely beds and plants already in place. Many additions have been made by the owners. Designed with a free flowing, whatever-happens-happens approach, this garden features a variety of perennials, bulb flowers, and annuals, including the owner's favorite large sunflowers. Featured trees include a variety of fruit trees, a Japanese Maple, and a bitter orange tree.

Careful placement of plantings allows for minimal watering in this garden, while leaf mulch collected from the yard helps conserve moisture. Natural fertilizers such as manure and compost provide a nutritional boost in the spring. Bird houses made by the owner add to the wildlife friendly environment enjoyed from a comfortable porch vantage point.



THE GOLDEN GARDEN | 2095 Plank Rd, Blacksburg. Paula & Terry Golden

A beautiful curved rock wall at the property entrance, curved deck and an interior curved wall inspired the contrast between the straight lines of the house and more organic shapes in the garden areas and patio, while sites visited by the owners during overseas travel inform much of the look and feel of the Golden Garden.

A grotto garden takes its inspiration from the magical water gardens of King Ludwig II. Colonnades seen in the missions of California are echoed in the long area under the deck. Millstones placed in the water feature connect the spirit of the house to those who provided for daily food needs with their toil and labor. The small stream mimics those found in our area, as well as ones in the Black Forest where Paula's family used to picnic.

[continued from page 2] Over the past two years, pollinator friendly plants have been added, including a wide swath of milkweed for monarch butterflies. Decorative additions include three large circular metal pieces from an Oklahoma City yard sale and glass flowers made by the owners' daughter.

A central element in the garden is the 190-year-old Eastern Red Cedar that provides shelter and food for a variety of birds. The Golden Garden is a certified wildlife habitat by the National Wildlife Federation.



THE HAHN/CHANCEY GARDEN | 2068 Lusters Gate Rd, Blacksburg. Betty Hahn & Doug Chancey The gardens at Paris Mountain Farm are a mixture of long-established areas and new "from scratch" areas. New sections include a patio area by the historic 1700s house, a garden alongside the fence by the recently added pool, and a large fenced-in quarter acre that contains the garden structure known as the "Tea House". Originally part of a hay field, the fenced garden was created about 12 years ago and designed around a central fire pit with circling paths. It has evolved since that time as the owners have continued planting trees, mostly food bearing, edible and medicinal herbs, and annual vegetables.

The various gardens on the property form a beautiful backdrop to the view of Paris Mountain behind them. A lovely, fragrant row of lavender borders one of the paths to the fire pit. Other favorites are the various monardas or bee balms in multiple colors. Favorite trees include the pawpaw trees which bear delicious fruit, lush hazelnuts and a Horse Chestnut tree which is so beautiful when it blooms.

The gardens are grown organically, incorporating a compost blend of kitchen scraps, grass clippings, leaf mulch, and manure, overlayered with natural mulch. Cover crops enrich the soil. The quarter acre garden is protected by a deer fence rigged by adding wire fencing to existing wood fences, with deer resistant plants in the areas outside the fence.

THE RAJAGOPALAN/MURALI GARDEN | 2770 Green Meadow Dr , Blacksburg. Padma Rajagopalan & T. M. Murali

Evolving from a nearly blank slate since 2007, this spectacular display of flowers has grown over the years. The dahlias come from bulbs planted more than 10 years ago, while many coneflowers and daisies started from just 2-3 plants. In late spring, there are rows of peonies in different locations in the garden. In summer, the pergola area is ringed by banks of dahlias, tithonias, daisies, coneflowers and rudbeckias, creating a colorful vista.

This beautiful garden is home to a fantastic collection of approximately 40 peonies that together produce over 1,000 blooms and includes several heirloom varieties. In addition to a lovely corkscrew willow tree, there is a delightful pergola with brick pathways in the front yard. Vines climb two trellises in the backyard.

Since their parents were avid gardeners, Padma Rajagopalan and T.M. Murali were introduced to gardening from an early age. They have planted a variety flowers that grew at their childhood homes (hollyhock, tithonia, dahlias, nasturtiums, jasmines, and roses) as an homage to their parents' gardens. A particular example is the rose "Crown Princess Margareta."



THE SCHNECKER GARDEN | 2791 Yarrow Rd , Blacksburg. Linda & Dennsi Schnecker

At the entrance to this beautiful property, the visitor is welcomed by a cozy stand of trees with a grouping of picnic tables. The curving, tree lined drive winds up a gentle slope to the house, which is nestled amongst colorful gardens. To the south is a vast, clear meadow overlooking Ellett Valley and Paris Mountain.

Since 1989, Linda and Dennis Schnecker have worked to turn a blank slate of overgrown scrub and blackberry brambles into thriving, diverse garden beds of trees, shrubs and flowers. Also on the property is a stream and water garden developed around native limestone, providing a favorite resting place to observe several types of fish and a variety of water plants.



THE SUTPHIN GARDEN | 1279 Catawba Rd, Blacksburg. Joann & J.B. Sutphin

Still Meadow Farm has been owned by the Sutphin family since 1935. The 2 story brick farmhouse on the property was originally built c.1840 by Croswell Henderson. In 2014, the property was placed in a land trust, thus preserving the beautiful vistas and acreage overlooking Paris Mountain and the Roanoke Valley. JB Sutphin, who was

born on the property, is responsible for the beautiful native stone walls and walks found around the patio and yard.

A spring supplies water for the patio water feature and water for the gardens and grounds. The front yard features a beautiful old sycamore tree and a large black locust covered with English ivy. The building in the back yard, originally an icehouse, conceals a trough in the floor where melted ice drained into the root cellar below. Hand hewn logs are visible on the inside. JB and Joann have worked on the yard and garden for 20 years, adding the patio and deck, a vegetable garden, a dry stream rock garden and a children's garden.

ADDITIONAL DETAILS | Also, as in years past, **beautiful full-color notecards** featuring this year's gardens will be for sale. Musicians from the New River Valley will be performing to compliment the beauty of the gardens. Along the route **Bootleg BBQ** food truck will set up at Gateway Baptist Church for those ready for a lunch between visiting gardens featured on the tour.

A longstanding tradition has the **New River Valley Master Gardeners** stationed in each garden throughout the day to assist the garden owners in answering questions related to the garden. Master gardeners also promote and highlight the sustainable features of each garden. The usage of drought tolerant plants, mulching methods, irrigation techniques and more are educational components the master gardeners are available to discuss. Visit the Master Gardener Plant Clinic tent to pick up your soil test kit, planting charts and ask questions about your own garden issues.

The tour also welcomes the **New River Land Trust** that will set up in one of the gardens, demonstrating the educational backpacks that were provided to the local libraries through a national grant.

Beginning May 5th, the Blacksburg Library will host a showing of **plein air art** created at the New River Valley Garden Tour in 2021. Outdoor (plein air) artists have become a popular addition to the tour that will celebrate its 26th year in 2022. The garden tour, hosted by the Montgomery-Floyd Regional Friends of the Library, welcomes artists that are invited to positioned themselves in various corners of the gardens, catching that perfect angle of the flowers, water feature or other artistic structure in the garden on the day of the tour. The Friends of the Library thank Teri Hoover of the Blacksburg Regional Art Association for coordinating this unique feature.
