Blacksburg | Hello Amazing Friends!

Now that I've been at the Blacksburg Library for three seasons (Summer, Winter, and Spring) I've had time to truly appreciate how amazing you all are throughout the year. I've met knowledgeable, committed Book Sale Friends, whose recent Bag Sale at the Blacksburg Library netted approximately \$835 for the Friends in just 6 hours for the public sale! I'm excited for the Garden Tour, which is heavily into the planning stage, and I am looking forward to seeing how I can be of service to the Garden Tour Friends this year!

I see the impact our Friends make in library programming every day. Family READS, our English Language Learning program in partnership with LNRV, reached approximately 10-12 families over the course of the Winter and Spring sessions. With your help, not only were we able to purchase craft supplies for weekly learning engagement activities for the children, but we were also able to provide food for the entire family to enjoy so they could focus on language learning and literacy activities.

We were able to bring the Mill Mountain Zoo to the library to conduct a Life Science program for children, which was specifically designed to meet SOL requirements. While it was promoted for Homeschool students, we asked the Zoo to come on a day that MCPS

students were out for a teacher work day. The program, attended by 60 people, focused on taxonomy and allowed the children to meet and interact with four different types of animals.

Fun (and Learning) events include our recent eclipse party, which had over 175 attendees (of all ages). Participants enjoyed eclipse-themed snacks, crafts, trivia, and entertainment while watching the live broadcast of the eclipse.

Did I mention author events? From our Poetry Reading and Author Talk for recently published authors from Virginia Tech to a special Storytime with local author Stacy Vaughn, we have events for all ages and interests, which meet the needs of our very diverse community. Recently published local author, Keith Hummel, gave an author talk at the library for his debut novel, Immortal Red. He will be returning to the library in July to do a writing workshop for kids and in October he will host a writing workshop for adults in preparation for NaN-oWriMo (National Novel Writing Month) held every November.

You are amazing in your support for the Library! We are able to offer the depth and breadth of programs to our community because of your support. Thank you.

Valuing Every Story: The New MFRL Digital **News Archive**

Montgomery-Floyd Regional Library system has as one of our core values Valuing Every Story. We wish to sustain and develop evolving platforms for sharing, creating and preserving stories past, present and yet to come. That is part of having the facilities to hold our collection, the technologies that let people find and access materials in that collection, and the staff with the expertise and commitment to make sure people can find the stories they need and want. But we try to value stories in other ways also, and one is in the role of providing access to local history. Whether in books, periodicals or programming, we hope to keep available the stories of the persons who came before us in the New River Valley.

Thanks to the support of the Floyd County Library Building Fund Inc., we began our development of the MFRL Digital News Archive in 2019, planning for the digitization of the Floyd Press microfilm held at Jessie Peterman Memorial Library. The Floyd County part of the MFRL Digital News Archive has been useful to historians, genealogists and others researching 19th and 20th century Floyd since 2021. Now with the support of the Montgomery-Floyd Regional Library Foundation, we have made available new digitized microfilm from the collection at Christiansburg Library.

Over 137 Montgomery County reels of microfilm were digitized by our partners at Advantage Archives, and now are available under our e-library heading on the library website, mfrl.org. Montgomery County newspaper titles include the Montgomery News Messenger and the News Messenger, and cover dates from 1950 through 2003. The full text and images from the newspapers are available, browsable by date, and searchable by keyword. There are built-in-tools to screen-grab, email, or save images or text. The new content amounts to over 180,000 newspaper page images and is a fascinating window into the life and progress of Montgomery County. Topics one can research can be as personal as a family

history, as historic as the growth of Virginia Tech, and as important as desegregation in the 1950's. As I often do to test out Virginia historical sources, I searched my Winchester, Virginia family name and quickly found a visit by my uncle, F.W. Sencindiver, to the grand opening of the Christiansburg DMV office in 1977. (Uncle Billy was Assistant Commissioner of the DMV in 1977). That office is of course now closed for renovation, but 47 years is not a bad run!

The Digital News Archive now contains about 88% of all the microfilm held at MFRL branches; as we work in the future, we hope to finish off the newspapers and also digitize some of the historical books we have that can be archived.

The thing about stories is you never know where they are going. But looking to history can help us know where the stories start.

DMV Computers Helping To Speed All Operations

CHRISTIANSBURG-The new Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) office on Rt. 114 about two miles from the intersection of Rts. 460-114 doesn't advertise itself as a one stop vehicle shop but it

All DMV functions are performed there from the drivers test through the picture-taking and other routines and the major convenience of acquiring a title on a motor vehicle within minutes.

Department officials and Del. W. Ward Teel were present for the formal opening of the new office Thursday at 2 p.m.

W. T. "Bill" Jackson is manager of the office, which has a direct computer link with the DMV central office in Richmond. Through use of a bank of

Through use of a bank of sending and receiving computers the necessary information can be recorded and within five minutes of the time the car owner entered the office he can leave with his vehicle title in hand. Formerly the process took about three weeks by mail.

The new office replaces smaller DMV licensing agent offices in Radford and Christiansburg. An office formerly located in the

Blacksburg Municipal Building was closed earlier Building was closed earlier and the new facility serves all three areas.

Former Radford license agent Vera Lyons has been transferred to the new office. transferred to the new office.







